Please follow these home care instructions for composite (white) fillings:

- When anesthetic has been used, your lips, teeth and tongue may be numb for several hours after the appointment. Avoid chewing until numbness has completely worn off. It is easy to bite or burn your tongue or lip while numb.
- Pain from the injections is very common OTC pain meds can be taken to alleviate the discomfort. A common side effect of local anesthetic injections is Trismus, or an inability to open very wide after dental injections. This is common and can be painful, but will subside with time and OTC pain meds. Another common occurrence is the cause of an internal bruise or a hematoma, which is swelling of the face caused by the needle. If this occurs please call our office, we will need to call you in antibiotics to insure no infection has occurred.
- You may take any over the counter pain reliever for tenderness or discomfort. You may take
  aspirin or Ibuprofen (Advil or Tylenol), unless you are allergic to these medications or have a
  medical condition that would prevent you from taking these medications. This will help with any
  soreness at the injection sites where your anesthetic was administered.
- It is normal to experience some hot, cold and pressure sensitivity after your appointment. Hot or cold sensitivity may linger for several weeks after the placement of the fillings. Usually these symptoms will subside over time.
- Your new fillings are fully hardened before you even leave the office; however, it is wise to chew
  on the opposite side from the location of the newly placed filling(s) until the anesthetic has worn
  off.
- One of the most common problems following filling placement with anesthesia, is an incorrect bite. If your bite feels uneven please call our office so we can get you scheduled to correct your bite.
